### Moíra's Meanderings



We recently had our Women's Weekend, and it was inspiring to watch a group of strangers come together, share openly, and form new friendships. The theme, 'Are you thirsty, come to the well?' encouraged us to express our spiritual needs and exchange life experiences. To me, this is the essence of Church: creating community, sharing in prayer, and acknowledging each other's journeys.

I once read a book called 'The Shaping of Things to Come' by David Frost and Alan Hirsch, which discusses new approaches to evangelism and developing church in today's world. The authors introduce the idea of 'sinking wells'—places that naturally draw people in and foster community around them. It's a compelling concept, one that I saw in action this weekend. I wonder, where are the 'wells' in your own life?

# A few challenging quotes by Alan Hirsch on Evangelisation today.

'The church of Jesus needs to wake up from the exile of passivity and embrace liminality and adventure or continue to remain a religious ghetto for culturally co-opted, fearful, middle-class folk'

A missional theology...applies to the whole of life of every believer. Every disciple is to be an agent of the kingdom of God, and every disciple is to carry the mission of God into every sphere of life. We are all missionaries sent into a non-Christian culture.

'Unless the church is equipping believers to embrace the values and vision of the kingdom of God and turn away from the materialism, consumerism, greed, and power of the present age, it not only abandons its biblical mandate, it is rendered missionally ineffective.'

In short, apostolic movement involves a radical community of disciples, centered on the lordship of Jesus, empowered by the Spirit, built squarely on a fivefold ministry, organized around mission where everyone (not just professionals) is considered an empowered agent, and tends to be decentralized in organizational structure.

### The Hope of life by Cathy Jenkins

Sometimes we confuse hope with optimism. In the world of faith seeking understanding through hope, along with faith and love, is a virtue. It is based in a confidence and trust of a better future. It is a sense that tomorrow might not be better, but that eventually things will be OK. It is hope which sustains and carries each believer through life.


It is also described as an eschatological virtue – hope has its foundation in the firm trust of God's promises for the future. That God is with us and that all will be well, eventually.

But hope, even for people of faith, can be an elusive virtue! Those of us who have known or are, perhaps, experiencing deep grief know that it is a vulnerable time. We may become acutely sensitive about things that don't usually bother us. Tears are never far and the mornings seem to bring weariness rather than relief. In those early days the first moment of waking comes as a shock when we so quickly realise the new reality in which we find ourselves.

The grief pilgrimage can be long and arduous and it can cower even the most robust of spirits. For people formed within the Catholic tradition November is a reminder of this as we remember and pray for our dead – those whose lives have been changed but not ended.

In Fratelli Tutti Pope Francis offered an invitation to everyone for renewed hope because hope speaks: of something deeply rooted in every human heart, independently of our circumstances and historical conditioning. Hope speaks to us of a thirst, an aspiration, a longing for a life of fulfilment, a desire to achieve great things, things that fill our heart and lift our spirit to lofty realities like truth, goodness and beauty, justice and love. Hope is bold... it can open us up to grand ideals that make life more beautiful and worthwhile. Let us continue, then, to advance the paths of hope.
